Indicators on the human rights of migrants

- f Growing demand for indicators for use in human rights assessments and in furthering national implementation of human rights obligations.
- f Knowledge-gap on the human rights situation of migrants, particularly of migrants in an irregular situation.
- f Where data is available, it can be incomplete.
 - Data on stock and flows: lack of detail on the circumstances of migrants.
 - Population censuses: limited value in tracking irregular and marginalized migrant populations.

- f OHCHR's methodology on human rights indicators.
- f Recommends the development of:
 - structural indicators: commitments and acceptance of international human rights standards.
 - process indicators : efforts being made to meet the obligations that flow from the standards.
